WHAT IS FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION?

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) comprises all procedures involving the partial or total removal of the external female genitalia or any other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons.

FGM has been categorised into four types, ranging from a symbolic prick to the clitoris to the extensive removal and narrowing of the vaginal opening. All these forms have been found in the UK. FGM is sometimes known as 'female genital cutting' or 'female circumcision'.

SPOTTING THE SIGNS

Suspicions may arise in a number of ways that a child is being prepared for FGM to take place abroad. These include knowing that the family belongs to a community in which FGM is practiced and is making preparations for the child to take a holiday, arranging vaccinations, or planning absence from school. The child may also talk about a special procedure or ceremony that is going to take place.

FACT: FGM IS NOT A RELIGIOUS REQUIREMENT OR OBLIGATION.

Indicators that FGM may already have occurred include prolonged absence from school or other activities with noticeable behaviour change on return, complaints about pain between their legs, or talk of something somebody did to them that they are not allowed to talk about.

FACT: WHILST FGM IS OFTEN SEEN AS AN ACT OF LOVE BY THE FAMILY RESPONSIBLE FOR ARRANGING FGM, IT CAUSES SIGNIFICANT HARM AND CONSTITUTES PHYSICAL AND EMOTIONAL ABUSE. IN THE UK IT IS CONSIDERED TO BE CHILD ABUSE, CARRYING A MAXIMUM PRISON SENTENCE OF 14 YEARS.
