Continuing to invest in policing to keep you, your family and your community safer





This year, the Police and Crime Commissioner will invest the additional money raised through the policing element of the council tax to enable police officers to spend more time in local communities and ensure they are equipped and supported to be as effective as they can be.

The table below shows the amount you will pay towards policing through your council tax this year, based on the band of your property:

I have the responsibility for setting the policing budget locally and I have been talking to local residents throughout the year about funding and policing priorities.

Last year, your support for an increase in the policing element of the council tax achieved the recruitment of 210 new police officers and 65 police investigators who are now actively working to keep you and your communities safer. With the announcement of increased national funding, we will also recruit an additional 156 police officers into Hampshire Constabulary.

Hampshire Constabulary continues to be under significant pressure with increased operational demand on current resourcing. This year support was given to increase the policing element of the council tax by £10 per year (based on a Band D property).


This additional funding will ensure we protect the new officers recruited last year, while also making a significant investment to improve public contact, which is what you have told me is important to you. It will allow us to continue the journey begun last year to greater effectiveness and visibility of policing in your communities to keep you all safer.


WHERE THE MONEY GOES 2020/21

DELIVERING POLICING

The amount shown on your council tax bill, that is allocated to the Police and Crime Commissioner, goes directly to policing for operational matters. Your increase will provide £7million additional funding for policing across Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton this year. All of this essential funding will:

- Allow police officers to spend more time in local communities to prevent and investigate crime as it happens
- Provide significant investment to improve all public contact, enabling your 999 and 101 calls to be handled more effectively
- Provide equipment and training to make police officers even more effective

The deployment of police officers in your local communities to prevent and tackle crime is an operational decision for the Chief Constable based on demand and risks. With a continued increase of new crimes including violent and knife crime and cyber crime, and the traditional crimes such as anti-social behaviour and theft, having the right number of officers in the right place is more important than ever. I will work with the Chief Constable to ensure that your additional contribution is used effectively to keep you safer.

SUPPORTING THE VULNERABLE AND POLICING THROUGH CRIME PREVENTION

Alongside the budget I allocate to policing, I also invest in over 70 local community projects annually that tackle the root causes of crime, including youth diversion initiatives, reducing reoffending, and supporting victims and the vulnerable. These not only help to improve life opportunities but they additionally help to prevent crime and reduce demand on frontline policing.

Reducing crime in our communities also requires a partnership response that goes beyond just policing and must be shared. This year I have set up a Violence Reduction Unit (VRU) which brings together partners from across the criminal justice system, health, business and local authorities with young people and communities to develop and deliver a joined up approach to prevent and tackle serious violence. This can only be achieved by working together and will focus resourcing in prevention to reduce demand on policing.
