# Background

The Police and Crime Commissioner has an ambition, through her Commissioning Team, for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight to be two of the safest places to live, work and visit in the country.

The current grant round, the Safer Communities Fund (SCF), has historically invited a diverse range of applications as long as they could evidence delivery against the Police and Crime Plan priorities. Since the 2022/23 financial year this has led to an annual spend of £880,000, funding 44 different projects to address the themes of:

- Preventing Youth Crime & Exploitation (£600,000; 68% of SCF Grant funding).
- Reducing Reoffending (£100,000; 11% of SCF Grant funding).
- Tackling ASB, Crime Prevention, Domestic Abuse, Equality & Inclusion and Hidden Harm (£280,000; 32% of SCF Grant funding).

Additionally, the Commissioner also allocates £357,000 in grants annually to the Youth Justice System (YJS) which is split across the four YJS's through an agreed formula based calculation. This funding is used by each YJS to support activities focused on Preventing Youth Crime and Exploitation.

Between the SCF and YJS grants the Commissioner currently spends £957,000 annually on Preventing Youth Crime and Exploitation, not including the projects funding through the Violence Reduction Unit. Both the SCF and YJS grants conclude on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2025.

Due to the level of funding allocated to the theme of preventing youth crime and exploitation, this Strategic Needs Assessment has been completed to explore youth needs across the 14 districts to help inform the Commissioner's next funding investment.

### Hampshire & Isle of Wight

### **Summary of Need**

- Projects that address Violence against the Person offences (35% of offending, 66% of victims), including serious violence (205 offences, 527 victims).
- Projects that address youth ASB (3,694).
- Projects that target male offenders (75%).
- Projects that engage looked after children (3,067).
- Projects that engage children suspended from education (25,531).
- Projects that run between 15:00-17:59 (19% of offending, 21% of victims).
- Projects that address offending in public locations (62% of offending).
- Projects that discuss healthy relationships, including domestic abuse (4,105 victims).

Hampshire & the Isle of Wight (HIOW) covers an area of 4,148 squared kilometres. It consists of four Unitary Authorities:
Hampshire,
Portsmouth,
Southampton, and the Isle of Wight, and 14

Local Authorities. HIOW has a population density of 487 usual residents per square kilometre. Across HIOW there are 561,557 young people aged 24 and under, of which around 52% are male (289,485) and 48% are female (272,072). Most young people between the ages of 16 and 24 are "straight or heterosexual" (173,300; 83%), and identify as a gender identity that is the same as their biological sex at birth (193,150; 92%). The majority (91%; 509,817) of young people do not have a disability. Around 86% (483,972) of young people are "White". Most young people did not have a religion (313,408; 55.8%), the next most prevalent religion was Christianity (177,253; 32%).

# Young People Committing Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 across HIOW HIOWC recorded 10,617 offences with an offender aged 10-24. Most were male (7,808; 75%), aged 18-24 (4,878; 47%), and White (5,801; 55%).

#### What?

The most commonly committed offences were Violence against the Person (3,681; 35%), Theft Offences (2,342; 22%), and Drug Offences (1,977; 19%). There were also:

- 3,694 incidents of youth Anti-Social Behaviour.
- 1,639 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 852 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly bladed implements (393; 46%).
- 328 hate related offences.
- 205 incidents of Serious Violence (including 2 homicides)
- 482 Domestic Abuse Offences.

#### Where?

Across HIOW the highest number of youth offences occurred in Southampton (2,067; 20%) and Portsmouth (1,829; 17%). The highest rate per 1,000



of the population occurred in the Isle of Wight (30 per 1,000). Overall:

- 6,560 (62%) occurred in public locations.
- 944 (9%) occurred in rural beat areas.
- 1,765 (17%) occurred in licensed premises.

# Young People Victimised by Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 HIOWC recorded 40,525 victims aged 0-24 across HIOW. Around 50% were female (20,279), and 47% were male (19,034), most were aged 18-24 (17,285; 43%), and the majority did not have a recorded ethnicity (29,872; 74%).

#### What?

The most common offences victimising young people were Violence against the Person (26,538; 66%), Sexual offences (4,271; 11%) and Theft offences (4,080; 10%). There were also:

- 3,072 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 2,349 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly non-bladed implements (1,112; 47%).
- 527 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 1,247 hate related offences.
- 4,105 Domestic Abuse offences.
- 4,214 cases of child abuse.

#### Where?

Across HIOW the highest number of youth victims occurred in Southampton (8,632; 21%) and Portsmouth (6,519; 16%). The highest rate per 1,000 of the population also occurred in Southampton (306 per 1,000). Overall:

- 13,665 (34%) occurred in public locations.
- 4,623 (11%) occurred in rural beat areas.
- 3,066 (8%) occurred in licensed premises.

### **Beyond Crime Data**

#### **Education**

In 2022/23 across HIOW:

- 190 (0.07%) students were excluded and 25,531 (10%) were suspended from education
- 48,634 (19%) students classed as persistent absentees.
- 63% of students achieved Grade 4 or above in GCSE Maths and English (12,377).

#### **Looked After Children**

In March 2023 there were 3,067 looked after children across HIOW. This equates to 27% of looked after children within the South East.

#### Healthcare

- In 2022/23 30 hospital admissions for assaults with sharp objects.
- In 2022/23 25,297 (3.6%) school aged children identified as having social, emotional, and mental health needs.

### **Employment & Housing**

- In 2023 5.1% (2,167) of 16-17 year olds are classified as NEET.
- In 2022/23 3,036 households owed a prevention duty under the Homelessness Reduction Act had dependent children.



# **Basingstoke & Deane**

### **Summary of Need**

- Projects aimed to reduce Violence against the Person Offences (38% of offenders, 70% of victims), use of bladed implements (75% of offences involving a weapon), and incidents of serious violence (40 offenders, 26 victims).
- Projects that run between 15:00-17:59 (22% of offending, 23% of victims).
- Projects that support those suspended (16,768 across HCC) from Education.
- Projects that explore healthy relationships, including domestic abuse (358 victims) and sexual offences (244 victims).
- Projects that target looked after children (1,853 across HCC).
- Projects that address youth ASB (238 incidents).
- Projects that address offending in public locations (61% of offending, 30% of victims).

Basingstoke & Deane is a Local Authority (LA) within the Hampshire County Council (HCC) Unitary Authority Area, covers an area of around 634 square kilometres, and has a population density of 292 persons per square kilometre. Basingstoke & Deane has a total population of 185,154,

of which 28% (51,651) are between the ages of 0-24. Amongst the young person population there is an almost equal gender split of 51% (26,545) male and 49% (25,106) female. Most young people between the ages of 16 and 24 are "straight or heterosexual" (13,930; 85%), and identify as a gender identity that is the same as their biological sex at birth (15,360; 94%). The majority (91%; 47,208) of young people do not have a disability. Around 85% (43,788) of young people are "White". Most young people did not have a religion (28,133; 54%), the next most prevalent religion was Christianity (17,220; 33%).

# Young People Committing Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 in Basingstoke & Deane HIOWC recorded 712 offences with an offender aged 10-24. Most were

Male (512; 71.9%), aged 18-24 (358; 50.3%), and White (392; 55.1%). In 2022 across HCC 100 per 100,000 young people were classed as First-Time Entrants, this data is not available at a LA level.

#### What?

The most commonly committed offences by young people in Basingstoke & Deane were Violence against the Person (273; 38.34%), Theft offences (145; 20.37%), and Drug Offences (131; 18.4%). There were also:

- 238 incidents of youth Anti-Social Behaviour.
- 93 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 88 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly bladed implements (66; 75%).
- 34 hate related offences.
- 40 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 35 Domestic Abuse Offences.

#### Where?

In 2023/24 6.7% of crimes committed by young people in HIOW occurred in Basingstoke & Deane (712).

# Young People Victimised by Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 HIOWC recorded 3,278 victims aged 0-24 in Basingstoke & Deane. Around 52.6% were female (1,725), and 45.3% were male (1,484), most were aged 18-24 (1,182; 36.1%), and the majority did not have a recorded ethnicity (2,456; 74.9%).

#### What?

The most common offences victimising young people were Violence against the Person (2,280; 69.55%), Sexual offences (343; 10.46%) and Sexual offences (244; 7.44%). There were also:

- 238 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 158 offences involved the use of a weapon, most commonly non-bladed implements (74; 47%).
- 26 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 93 hate related offences.
- 358 Domestic Abuse offences.
- 434 cases of child abuse.

#### Where?

In 2023/24 8.1% (3,278) of crimes that victimised young people in HIOW occurred in Basingstoke & Deane.

Education data is not available at a LA level. In 2022/23 within the HIPS area, HCC had:

- The highest number of students experiencing suspensions (16,768) and exclusions (124).
- 31,777 (18.4%) students classed as persistent absentees- lowest in HIPS area and below the rate for England and the South East.
- The highest rate of students achieving Grade 4 or above in GCSE Maths and English (66%).

In March 2023 there were 1,853 looked after children in HCC (60% of HIPS), this data is not available at an LA level. This equals 65 looked after children under 18 year olds per 10,000 of the population.

- Projects that support young men (82% of offenders).
- Projects that address crime in rural beat areas (60% of offences, 56% of victims).
- Projects that engage with looked after children (1,853 across HCC).
- Projects that support those suspended (16,768 across HCC) from Education.

East Hampshire is a Local Authority (LA) within the Hampshire County Council (HCC) Unitary Authority Area, covers an area of around 514 square kilometres and has a population density of 244 persons per square kilometre. East Hampshire has a total population of 125,744, of

which 26% (32,629) are between the ages of 0-24. Amongst the young person population there is an almost equal gender split of 51% (16,663) male and 49% (15,966) female. Most young people between the ages of 16 and 24 are "straight or heterosexual" (9,060; 84%), and identify as a gender identity that is the same as their biological sex at birth (10,045; 94%). The majority (92%; 30,018) of young people do not have a disability. Around 93% (30,405) of young people are "White". Most young people did not have a religion (17,528; 54%), the next most prevalent religion was Christianity (12,070; 37%).

# Young People Committing Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 in East Hampshire HIOWC recorded 330 offences with an offender aged 10-24. The majority were Male (272; 82.4%), aged 18-24 (169; 51.2%), and White (206; 62.4%). In 2022 across HCC 100 per 100,000 young people were classed as First-Time Entrants, this data is not available at a LA level.

#### What?

The most commonly committed offences by young people in East Hampshire were Violence against the Person (99; 30%), Theft Offences (74; 22.4%), and Drug Offences (71; 21.52%). There were also:

- 129 incidents of youth Anti-Social Behaviour.
- 30 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 19 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly non-bladed implements (11; 58%).
- 17 hate related offences.
- 2 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 12 Domestic Abuse Offences.

In 2023/24 3.1% of crimes committed by young people in HIOW occurred in East Hampshire.

# Young People Victimised by Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 HIOWC recorded 1,369 victims aged 0-24 in East Hampshire. Around 50% were female (691), and 47% were male (662), most were aged 18-24



(526; 38%), and the majority did not have a recorded ethnicity (1,051; 75.3%).

#### What?

The most common offences victimising young people in East Hampshire were Violence against the Person offences (963; 69%), Theft offences (131; 9.4%) and Sexual offences (123; 8.8%). There were also:

- 80 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 67 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly non-bladed implements (40; 60%).
- 15 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 45 hate related offences.
- 143 Domestic Abuse offences.
- 180 cases of child abuse.

In 2023/24 3% of crimes that victimised young people in HIOW occurred in East Hampshire.

- Projects that target 14-17 year olds (41% offenders).
- Projects that engage with looked after children (1,853 across HCC).
- Projects that support those suspended (16,768 across HCC) from Education.

Eastleigh is a Local Authority (LA) within the Hampshire County Council (HCC) Unitary Authority Area, covers an area of around 80 square kilometres, and has a population density of 1,712 persons per square kilometre. Eastleigh has a total population of 136,450, of which 28% (37,866) are

between the ages of 0-24. Amongst the young person population there is an almost equal gender split of 51% (19,479) male and 49% (18,387) female. Most young people between the ages of 16 and 24 are "straight or heterosexual" (9,060; 84%), and identify as a gender identity that is the same as their biological sex at birth (11,140; 96%). The majority (92%; 34,660) of young people do not have a disability. Around 89% (33,798) of young people are "White". Most young people did not have a religion (21,830; 58%), the next most prevalent religion was Christianity (11,981; 32%).

# Young People Committing Crimes Who?

In 2023/24 in Eastleigh HIOWC recorded 728 offences with an offender aged 10-24 in Eastleigh. Most were

Male (530; 73%), aged 14-17 (299; 41%), and White (387; 53.2%). In 2022 across HCC 100 per 100,000 young people were classed as First-Time Entrants, this data is not available at a LA level.

#### What?

The most commonly committed offences were Theft offences (275; 38%), Violence against the Person offences (230; 32%), and Drug offences (99; 13.6%). There were also:

- 253 incidents of youth Anti-Social Behaviour.
- 91 offences that involved the use of a substance.
- 37 offences that involved the use of a weapon, most commonly firearms (12; 32.4%).
- 26 hate related offences.
- 8 incidents of Serious Violence.
- 22 Domestic Abuse Offences.
